

Message from our "Foreign Correspondent", that's Didi. It is tough to settle in to a new habitat! Amsterdam is so different from Bantry comparisons are nearly impossible. This also has its benefits as you can't really think of 'this is better' or 'this is worse'. It is just ... completely different! Some things don't change though and I found myself volunteering for a cat (only) shelter in North West Amsterdam (SAZ) while looking for a job. I had offered to go out trapping, but the need for feral cat TNR is fairly low until April. So I ended up cleaning the quarantine area, learning a lot about infection prevention in the process! It is very nice to see how you can find people dedicated to animal welfare EVERYWHERE. It is less hopeful to see they are facing the same problems, RAWR encounters on a regular basis. People in the Netherlands can be just as self-centred about 'owning' an animal without taking responsibility for it. EG: at this time of year the SAZ is primarily taking in sick cats from people on benefit as they can't afford to pay the vet. For each individual cat, the SAZ is a great resource. They deserve the chance to get better and most are returned home. Most owners do try to learn how to take (better) care of their pets after such an episode. However, deep down I do feel doubt about the long-term sustainability of this type of charity and the benefits for the feline community as a whole.

Update on Red Spirits

If you've been on the website or the Facebook page you might have seen the story of Spirit, the little red kitten that was found by pure



Spirit was brought to us two days after Christmas barely alive, in a pitiful state, having been hit by a car. Upon the vet examining him it was discovered that he had two broken legs, one front and one back. After being treated for shock, he perked up and has been making steady progress ever since. The little guy has come on in leaps and bounds. (not literally, yet, but soon!) Now his broken bones are healing, Spirit is running around the place, trying to make up for lost time and generally being a mischievous little fellow! He still needs a little more time to recover but so far his future is now looking much brighter!

Are the Animals in your care Micro-chipped?

Recently RAWR was alerted to a cat in Bantry town, hit by a car We picked her up, straight to the vet, but sadly her injuries were too severe & she passed away. Unfortunately she had no ID (no collar, tag or microchip) so we have not been able to inform the owner. We would like to remind all our supporters of the importance of ID, not just for you but for your pets as well. All strays we take in are scanned for a chip which helps us to return them to their families. Without a means of ID it is difficult, if not impossible to reunite animals & humans. It is a legal requirement that all dogs have an ID tag in Ireland. All 'RAWR' animals are microchipped before they are re-homed. A microchip is tiny, the size of a grain of rice which is implanted under the skin using a needle & injected by a vet. It hurts no more than any other injection and it can mean the difference between finding and losing forever your animal companion. It is your proof that the animal is yours. Don't let them get lost - talk to your vet today about microchipping, its safe and affordable. - Don't be without it!
