




Art & Animals

Cookies

Cookies have a specific role on the RAWR website. A cookie is a small piece of data sent from RAWR and stored in your web browser while browsing our site. When you come back to the site, this data can be retrieved and improve your browsing experience. It is important to know that our cookies are not tracking or collecting information! We also use other kinds of cookies that perform essential functions. Most importantly, authentication cookies so our servers know whether somebody is logged in or not. Without such a mechanism, the RAWR site would not know whether to send sensitive information or not!

The expression 'pigs might fly' has been in use for a long time! For two hundred years it has been a sarcastic rejoinder to overly optimistic predictions (which we never do at RAWR by the way!). **But we** do wonder: why pigs? She wriggled through the puddles and underneath in the dark and the dirt and rescued all of them from the cold wet night, going back later for

their mother once they were in a safe, warm place.

This is what happens when dogs are left to roam un-neutered. They get pregnant and will later search out places to give birth away from humans. The puppies don't get the benefit of veterinary attention and often get sick or die especially if the mother is not being fed properly and is unable to provide proper nutrition





These little puppies were lucky and have now gone to a rescue organization to be cared for and found forever homes.
