JANUARY was busy for our TNR volunteers with several private home trappings as well as a larger operation on a farm over two days. January weather and conditions bring their own difficulties which can mean the volunteer trapping in the dark – it doesn't get light in deepest west Cork much before 9.00 am and cats are often fed before their carers leave for work.

It is always a good idea to set traps at the usual feeding time because a hungry cat is easier to entice into the trap than one with a full tummy.

The farmyard was, as often in winter, muddy and the operation complicated by a flock of hens who were very curious to see what food was in the traps. They were gently encouraged to move to another part of the farm clucking and flapping as they went. Trapping was accomplished of all but two cats on the first day. These two, not much more than kittens, walked around, sniffed, sat on or next to traps, but would not go in. So, returning twice the following day our trappers caught the final two watched by a herd of cows in the nearby barn.

They stood, gently chewing their breakfast (the cows that is), completely unperturbed by this unusual human behaviour; gazing out as traps were set and cats transferred into baskets and loaded up for the trip to the vet.

On a more serious note, we must care for and about all animals and their environment.



In March we held our 7th Fix It For A Fiver week where owners of pets and guardians of ferals can have their cats neutered for just €5 each. Every cat neutered will either have

its left ear tipped or, for an extra €20, be microchipped. This is so it can be seen from a distance that it is neutered or, if found straying, checked for a chip and the owner contacted. This means the cat does not need to undergo unnecessary surgery in the future.


This initiative was as popular as ever. With the support of The Veterinary Clinic in Bantry and Castlelands-Hourihanes in Skibbereen 199 cats were neutered, while many owners arranged separately for vaccinations, and flea & worm treatment to be given at the same time which gives the cats a healthier and happier chance at life.
